Theory – Method – Data – Application

Applied Psychological Bulletin publishes empirical research in psychology and the behavioral sciences. Qualitative (narrative), and quantitative, and meta-analytic methods will be considered. *Applied Psychological Bulletin* is open access, published on the World Wide Web, with at least two issues per calendar year.

Submitted articles should be original and based on data relevant to psychology and the behavioral sciences. We publish short articles, replications of results, meta-analyses, program evaluations. We do not publish literature reviews.

We are interested in papers based on a theoretical concept, that reflect standard methods and procedures appropriate to the research area, include clear explanations of data analyses, and reach conclusions that comment on applicability of your findings.

Like most journals we value studies with statistically significant results. However, non-significant results can be valuable when based on adequate sample size and accompanied by an interesting theoretical applied or methodological explanation for the non-significant results. Those using qualitative methods should explain the criteria used to determine adequate sample size.

Manuscripts dealing with topics in the behavioral sciences are welcome (e.g; psychology, criminal justice, nursing, social sciences, etc.), as are evaluations of applied programs and interventions. The primary (first) author must have been working on an undergraduate or graduate degree during data collection. Papers may be coauthored with other students, a faculty advisor, or others. We encourage papers based on findings presented at research conferences.

Regardless of the field of research or scope; all student submissions will be reviewed and considered for publication.

Prior to submission, please carefully read and follow the submission guidelines detailed below. Manuscripts that do not conform to the submission guidelines may be returned without review. See the following pages.

Submissions

All manuscripts should be submitted electronically through email as an attachment in any of the formats listed below. Send submissions to mark.stasson@metrostate.edu and make sure you put “APB” at the start of the subject field in your e-mail.

All efforts should be undertaken to submit manuscripts **electronically** to the editor. Files can be sent in Microsoft Word, RTF or as a PDF file. The version sent should be consistent with the complete APA-style research submissions.

Prepare manuscripts according to the *Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association* ([6th edition](#)). Manuscripts may be copyedited for bias-free language (see Chapter 3 of the *Publication Manual*). Please follow all APA guidelines including double-spacing, as well as instructions on preparing tables, figures, references, metrics, and abstracts.

All manuscripts must include an abstract containing between 50 and 150 words submitted on a separate page. After the abstract, please supply up to five keywords or brief phrases that pertain to your articles content, this allows for your article to be searchable in an online database.

Every effort should be made to ensure that the manuscript itself contains no errors in reporting, grammar, structure or style. The author should have their paper proof read by several people prior to submission. You may wish to get feedback from your faculty research advisor or course instructor. Hard copy submissions will not be accepted. An electronic submission consists of an email in which you ask the journal to consider your paper and outline when the data were collected and verify your student status at the time of your data collection. Attach your completed manuscript to the email (Word, RTF and PDF attachments are acceptable formats). When you have submitted your paper you will be emailed a form that must be completed and sent back to the editor before your submission will be considered complete.

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Review Policy

Your paper will be reviewed by two or more members of the editorial board or others with knowledge of the subject area. Based on these reviews the editors will decide to either: (1) Accept your paper pending minor revisions; (2) Encourage you to revise your paper according to

suggestions made by the reviewers and resubmit it to the journal; or (3) Decline to publish your paper.

Regardless of the outcome you will receive a letter explaining the decision and copies of the reviewer's comments and suggestions. Our goal is to provide this decision to you within 30-60 days after your completed submission. However, please realize that the journal relies on volunteers so there may be some times when we cannot meet this goal.

If you have been asked to make revisions and to resubmit your paper you should follow the guidance of the reviewers suggestions you revise your paper. You should resubmit the revised document as soon as possible along with a letter outlining how you addressed each reviewer's comments.

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If an author feels that withholding his or her identity is critical to receiving a fair review, such a request along with its justification should be made in the cover letter accompanying the manuscript.

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
